## **Monthly Newsletter October 2019**



Launceston and North Cornwall Motor Club will celebrate their centenary next year. Founded in 1920, we are one of the earliest motor clubs to be formed in the South West and the first in Cornwall. Originally named "The Dunheved Motor Club" we owe our formation to an enthusiastic bunch of motor cyclists who lived in Launceston and the surrounding countryside. The first Secretary was Maurice Prout, the then Editor of the Cornish & Devon Post. Many social events were organised in the early days. Including a popular Thursday afternoon run to Crackington and back and for a real test of stamina the occasional run to Lands End and back. On the competitive side rallys, sprints and hill climbs were in vogue and the latter usually involved timed runs over a half mile length on a public road.

Motor cars began to mix with motorcycles in the 1930s, by which time our Club had changed its name to "The North Cornwall Motor Club.

After the war there was a wave of enthusiasm and interest and George Edwards and Bob and Nancy Parsons organised all types of events from trials to driving tests and rallies. Throughout this time there was always an active mix of motorcycles and cars, though interest from motor cyclists waned in the late 60s. However, motorcycle interest revived again in the 70s when we became one of the first clubs (apart from the M.C.C.) to include motorcycles with cars in our classic road trials. Our club membership continues to include amongst many local enthusiasts and top national exponents of trials. In 1980 we changed to our present name, "The Launceston and North Cornwall Motor Club", once more identifying with our origins.



A visit from a friend recently had Vivien and I chuckling in that he gave me an old Tamar Trial programme from 1993, I know it's only 26 years ago but it is still a reasonable passage of time. When I looked at the entry list number 63 was Vivien and myself in the Austin 7. It somehow seems such a long time ago, the Clerks of the course were our President Robin Moore, ex chair Warin Kelly and David Uglow. I have enclosed the centre spread map of the event as drawn by Warin showing the start at Lewdown Services on the old A30 and finishing at the Wellington Hotel , Boscastle . There were many familiar sections in use then that are still in use now, some have fallen by the wayside with others taking their place.

This was the 47<sup>th</sup> Tamar, but as Robin had mentioned in his opening gambit no one is really sure how old this event is but it is now well over 70 years of age ,though many of the competitors competing then are missing from current day programmes, in fact there is only a handful of those earlier competitors still trialling (maybe they just became sensible) but whatever the reason it is good to see that the event lives on.

## And now we have part 2 of our President's Historical Notes.

As related in part one, the majority of motor clubs were initially formed to cater for the motorcycle enthusiast, and whilst impetus was slow before the First World War there was renewed vigour post 1918 when many clubs came into being.

The Launceston and North Cornwall Motor Club as we know it today, is no exception. It originally started in this post war period, and so we now find ourselves in our Centenary year.

There has been some confusion in my own mind because I have always understood that the year of our club's birth was 1920. The oldest trophy in our collection is The Lifton and District Cup engraved with this date. The origins of this are obscure and it would be nice to know precisely how this came into our club's possession.

However I am indebted to the Cornish & Devon Post for their weekly series of snippets of news from past editions. The issue dated 20<sup>th</sup> August 1919 stated "A Motor-cycle club has been formed at Launceston and the opening run to Tavistock will take place next Monday".

The following week under the same caption of the C & D recorded August 29<sup>th</sup> 1919, "The opening run of Dunheved (Launceston) and District Motor-cycle Club took place on Monday"..

So there we have the proof, and our club has been part of the "Lanson scene" ever since.
